The Usage of Switzerland's Imperforate Sitting Helvetia Issue of 1854 - 1863

Introduction to Traditional Exhibit

Stamps became obligatory for prepayment of both domestic and international postage on October 11, 1854. Anticipating the need, the Swiss Post Office Department contracted for printing the imperforate *Sitting Helvetias* in March of 1852. The first stamps were printed in Bavaria on locally made paper. The first use of Swiss-made paper was in 1856. Slow production methods and constantly rising demand for stamps led to the many printings, stopgap use of earlier rejected printings on thin paper, and replacement of the hand press with a faster machine press. The Imperforate *Sitting Helvetias* are also known by the *Strubel* nickname, being named after a children's book character named *Strubel* (Struwel) Peter with wind -blown hair.

The first *Strubels* were available to the public on September 14, 1854, and lost their validity on July 31, 1863. During the *Strubel* era, the Postal Department issued dozens of versions of seven values denominated in rappen: 2, 5, 10, 15, 20, 40, and 1 franc (equal to 100 rappen). They were printed closely spaced in sheets of 25, 50, or 100. Their most noteworthy feature is the single imbedded silk security thread that runs horizontally through each stamp. Switzerland's imperforate *Sitting Helvetias*, are probably the most intensely studied issue in the history of Swiss philately. The latest and biggest study, published in 2006, forced the annual Swiss catalogs to add revised listings for these stamps in their 2008 editions. The biggest change was *the addition of the 25D*.

During the Strubel's approximate 10—year life, **mixed frankings** were possible with preceding imperforate and succeeding perforated issues for a very short time. Additionally, for all this time, complex pre-Universal Postal Union rates prevailed for foreign-bound mail until much time after this issues validity expired on July 31, 1863. Because the exhibit is focused on usages and order of release, used stamps and use on cover is featured. The seven different issuing periods are divided into three sections shown below.

Organization and Presentation

Using the classification of *The Zumstein Specialkatalog* of each issue, i. e., Aa, A, B, etc, the exhibit is divided into three parts:

1st Period 1854-1855 Munich Printing (Aa, A, B.) green threads. 2nd Period 1855-1857 Bern Printing C, D, E.) different colored threads. 3rd Period 1857 – 1863 Bern Printing (F, G) green threads

The number of pages devoted to each printing reflects the variations in the number of denominations, number of color varieties, and length of use. The items are shown by issue, by cover, and by other varieties on and off cover showing normal and unusual rates. These are varied to maximize the number of topical items shown.

Synopsis Of The Usage of Switzerland's Imperforate Sitting Helvetia Issue Of 1854 – 1863

This traditional Postal exhibit is the **Number 1 World Class** Swiss Imperforate Sitting Helvetia exhibit, a 45-year effort. The issue is one of the Swiss Classics, celebrating its 150th birthday in 2004, commonly called *Strubels*. This exhibit is to show as many different facets of this popular Swiss collecting area as possible, and have the exhibit serve as a resource for current ongoing research dealing with areas of color, silk threads, and usage.

What is Shown

There are individual items, multiple items on and off cover, stamp combinations, world class destinations, lake ship mail, production, printing, and color varieties, bisected stamps on cover, a privately perforated stamp, cancellations, postal markings, mixed franking covers, and more.

This exhibit is important for the following reasons:

- The exhibit shows all 32 recognized items on cover, and it is the only Strubel exhibit with a single use cover of all values known on cover.
- It is the only 10-frame Strubel exhibit shown in the United States, and it has more unique and unusual Strubel items than have been shown anywhere at one time.
- The present structure is built around many items from past multiple grand award winning exhibits, and contains destination covers not readily known or available at the time of those exhibits.
- The exhibit contains the finest copy of the second rarest Swiss stamp, and another one that is almost equal to it.

Using the *Zumstein* Specialized Catalog designations of each issue, i.e., Aa, A, B, C, etc. the seven different issues are divided into three parts: For this issue only, because of the vast variety, experts recommend the use of the numbers, and they have been used in <u>all</u> *Strubel* past grand award winner's exhibits. These designations are used as headers for each of the 32 different stamps issued.

1st Period 1854 – 1855 Munich Printing (Aa, A, B) green threads 2nd Period 1855 – 1857 Bern printing (C, D, E) different colored threads 3rd Period 1857 – 1863 Bern printing (F, G) green threads

Quality and Challenge Factor

Examples are of the highest quality available. In fact, it is the finest exhibit of this issue assembled to date containing both unrivaled rarity and quality. Many items are in quantities of 20 or less. Most thin paper items have certificates or are signed.



Following breakdown of presses at University of Munich printery in November 1852 and lengty repairs, Swiss Postal Department canceled it's contract for stamps, entrusting printing to Federal Mint in Bern in March, 1854, and ordered Munich to turn overall printed and unprinted paper.

Printing for the 1st Bern period (No's B & F, all with green silk threads), 2nd Bern period (Nos. C, D, & E, with different colored threads) and 3rd Bern period (No. G, with green threads) are divided according to Plates I and II for 25-stamp sheets and Plates III and IV for 50-stamp sheets.

The difference among stamps from the four plates are the amount of space between cliches, regularity of cliche allignment, completeness of printed frame lines, and source of paper. Not all stamps were printed from all four plates. Shown above are examples of Plates I & II.


